Apostrophes are used to replace missing letters:
 cannot = **can't**
 will not = **won't**
 do not = **don't**
 he is = **he's**
 they are = **they're**

Help Yourself to Write In Year 1 and 2


A sentence begins with a capital letter and ends with a full stop.

Everyone's name begins with a capital letter, including the word **I**

Nouns Name of a person, place, event or thing	moon garden cow pot mum
Adjective Modifies (changes) a noun	chilly dirty muddy pretty hot
Verb do, doing, done: Action words (is, are, am)	said drives ate lived running shouting
Conjunctions Joining ideas together	and but or so because when if that
Adverb: Modifies (changes) a verb, adjective or other adverbs!	slowly soon badly beautifully gently

Exclamation sentences start with:
 'What' or 'How'
 What a great day we had!
 How amazing that was!

Command sentences start with a bossy verb:
Clean that mess up.
Roll the dice three times.
